

Water Conservation

As summer approaches, the Town of Berthoud would like to remind everyone how vital water conservation is for all of us. Since 2000, the State has experienced the highest summer and spring average temperatures in the historical record. Six of the eight warmest years on record for Colorado have occurred since 2012. In addition to the overall trend of higher average temperatures, the number of very hot days has been above average since 2000.

As Colorado gets warmer, water becomes more and more precious. To help conserve this natural resource, the Town code prohibits irrigation between 10:00 am – 6:00 pm. Exceptions to this ordinance include micro-irrigation, hand watering, soaker hoses, drip irrigation systems, or establishing a new lawn.

As members of our community, it is our responsibility to be good stewards of this critically important resource.

Conserving water helps your wallet and your lawn. Here are some practical reasons to limit water usage:

- Save your money – Watering during cooler times of the day reduces evaporation caused by heat and wind, allowing you to water less frequently. Less watering means a lower water bill.
- Save your lawn - Smart-watering practices reduce runoff, increase absorption, and help prevent root rot and other problems caused by water-logged soils.

Here are a few facts, tips, and tools to help you be more water conscious:

- Check all plumbing fixtures and irrigation systems yearly. Over a one month time frame, a dripping faucet can lose 10,800 gallons, while a leaking toilet loses 21,000. And a stuck float in a livestock watering trough can lead to a loss of 216,000 gallons.
- Over half of all inside water use takes place in the bathroom. By replacing just one showerhead with a WaterSense labeled model, the EPA estimates the average family can save 2,700 gallons annually.
- 30% or more of water used in a household is typically devoted to the outside of your property. However, that number can be as high as 70% during the summer.

- According to the CSU extension program, "the rule of thumb for watering an established lawn is, 'water as deeply and infrequently as possible'. This is because this type of irrigation stimulates root growth, resulting in healthy, drought-tolerant, and pest-resistant turf. While it's true that a deep, healthy root system produces vigorous turf, rooting depth is determined primarily by genetics and soil condition, not irrigation.
- Mowing your lawn is good for growth. If you raise the lawnmower blade, and keep it sharp, you'll have a healthier lawn. Longer grass promotes deeper root growth which requires less watering. This doesn't mean mowing it less frequently; it simply means cutting it at a higher level each time you mow.

By using water more efficiently, you are helping ensure reliable water supplies are there to meet our needs and those of future generations.
